### **A.T. Maintenance Work Trip from Cosby Knob Shelter to Camel Gap- Saturday September 9**

### **Crucial Volunteer Opportunities- PLEASE consider helping**

As of the end of 2023, we have several very critical volunteer positions open.

**Mulch Bagging:** Charlie McDonald is retiring after 4 years of steady work to prep our 20lb. mulch bags (hikers) and 40lb. mulch bags (horses) to get mulch to our composting privies on the A.T. This position involves going to the mulch tent at Elkmont (we'll show you where) and bagging mulch, as well as spreading additional mulch out to dry under the tent. It involves 6-8 trips a year, usually lasting 2-3 hours per trip. Charlie will train you. This job is foundational to keep Mulch Ops running. ## **S.W.E.A.T. and Rocky Top**

S.W.E.A.T. has completed their hitches for the summer; hopefully you have seen the Fastfield reports about all of their incredible work doing general, much-needed general maintenance on some of our most remote sections of A.T. The Rocky Top season is now here, and will be run as a pro-crew this year because of the black mold remediation situation at Soak Ash. (Soak Ash is clear of mold, but still needs some additional work and will not be used again until next year). The Rocky Top crews will be working between Mt. Chapman and Mt. Guyot, based out of Tricorner. Next year we will return to the volunteer model for Rocky Top. The schedule is listed below:

## A. T. Work Trips From 7/15/2023 to 8/17/2023

**7/15 - Randy Bullock, Franklin LaFond - Fontana Dam to Route 28** - Assisted Konnarock work crew and volunteers with second week of trail reroute. We finished cribbing, added steps, finished tread work, added drainage, opened each end of the trail, blazed and blocked old trail.

**7/22 - Taylor Weatherbee - Sugarland Mt Tr to Collins Gap** - Cleared vegetation, mostly grass and briars, cut down several low-hanging branches, and removed 2 small blowdowns (one was around 1/4 mi south of Collins Gap, reported by a hiker).

**7/24 - Bill Pyle, Rick Hughes, Jeff Osler, Taylor Weatherbee - Davenport Gap to 1 mi N of Cam (4250' EI)** - Used Helen (Bill Pyle's crosscut) to clear blowdowns reported 0.77 and 3.74 miles south of Davenport Gap, as well as 2 "bonus trees". Great day on the AT with a great bunch of guys. Then dinner at Buc-ees!

**7/24 - Patti Grady, Diane Petrilla - Indian Gap/Rd Pr Tr to Rd Prng/Tom Prng Lead** - Completed all necessary brushing. Skim cleared all 96 waterbars.

**7/24 - Pete Berntsen - False Gap to Dry Sluice Gap** - Trimmed brush from Dry Sluice Gap (DSG) to one mile NE of DSG. Used handsaw to remove branches from a 14-in diameter (measured) blowdown to enable hikers to go under the tree. This blowdown took a 4-in tree down with it. The 4-in tree was removed except for a part that was cut to provide a handle to aid in getting around and up the portion of trail blocked by the larger tree. I saw four hikers get under the blowdown without having to remove backpacks. The blowdowns are located about 0.3-mi NE of Dry Sluice Gap.

**7/26 - Judy Wade, Keith Mertz - Fontana Dam to Route 28** - Painted new blazes/repainted fading blazes. Brushed out trail. Lopped intruding limbs. Tossed limbs and branches.

**7/29 - Taylor Weatherbee - Indian Gap/Rd Pr Tr to Sugarland Mt Tr** - Cleared vegetation from Fork Ridge to Mt Collins summit, then down to the Collins shelter. Spent 3 hours with scythe around Collins shelter. Clearing grass, briars, and other weeds. Should have brought a baler! Cleaned a

few water bars. Then went to get the blowdown Diane reported 0.3 mi south of Indian Gap. Took 2 cuts with crosscut.

**7/30 - Lisa Sumter - Davenport Gap to Chestnut Br Trail** - Cut back vegetation focusing on the area south of the shelter to Chestnut Branch & also around the shelter. Packed out micro & fireplace trash.

**8/1 - Randy Mitchell, Bill Pyle, Rick Hughes, Taylor Weatherbee - False Gap to Dry Sluice Gap** - Cut a 16-in blowdown off the trail, a little complicated by a lot of end and top bind. Also got a "bonus" dead leaner closer to Charlie's Bunion.

**8/2 - Randy Mitchell, Aenan Fee - Low Gap to Cosby Knob Top** - Cut back summer growth on the trail from Low Gap to Cosby Knob Shelter. Trimmed briars and stinging nettle from around the shelter, fire ring and spring. Picked up micro trash at shelter. There was very little trash at the shelter. Filled the mulch buckets at the privy. Spent some time repairing the lower hinge on the privy door (again!). Took several photos of the door and made measurements for replacement hinges. On the way back down, we removed a 9-in diameter tree from Low Gap trail. It was easier to clear than anticipated as someone had already cut completely around the tree on the upper side but had not reached the heartwood of the tree.

**8/5 - Pete Berntsen - False Gap to Dry Sluice Gap** - Completed cutting brush. At location about 1.5 mi NE of Dry Sluice Gap; refurbished 123 feet of trail, cleaned ten water drains, removed 25 feet of berm to improve water flow, and repaired one rock step.

**8/5 - Rick Hughes, Gerald Green, Melanie Harmon, Aenan Fee, Randy Mitchell, John Phillips, Trudy Phillips, Diane Petrilla, Terry Martin, Mike Harrington, Rob Davis, Mary Thornburgh, Neil Snapp, Bryan Voncannon, John Lee, David Gall - Mulch Operations** - This group of 16 truly magnificent mulch mules backpacked 380 lbs. of mulch to the Double Springs mulch storage bins, and then 7 folks backpacked 280 lbs. of mulch to Mt Collins. We had the pleasure of welcoming several new mulch mules! We were also joined by John and Trudy Philips from the Natural Bridge Appalachian Trail Club who are learning about

moldering privies in preparation for building one on their area of the A.T. in Virginia. When we hiked back to the CD parking lot, the traffic was crazy, and we had some maneuvering to be able to depart that lot and park at Fork Ridge. But everyone rose to the occasion and were good-natured and patient. I also introduced our 2 new Mulch Ops leaders, Mike Harrington and Terry Martin to the group, in anticipation of my move to California next Spring.

**8/6 - Randy Bullock, Sunaree Bullock - Brown Fork Gap to Stekoah Gap** - Cleared water bars, brushing and pruning, filled leaf buckets and packed-out minimal trash at shelter.

**8/7 - Charlie McDonald - Mulch Operations** - Bagged and delivered 31/20lb bags of mulch to the Sugarlands bins. Current inventory in the bins 34//20lb bags. I'll be reaching out to Christine and request a mulch drop in front of the tent at Elkmont. Dried mulch under the tent is very low.

**8/7 - Randy Bullock, Sunaree Bullock - Stekoah Gap to Locust Cove Gap** - Brushing, cleared water bars.

**8/9 - Mark Holmberg, Cynthia Holmberg - Wright Gap to Wesser** - Cleaned water bars, removed branches and one small blowdown.

**8/9 - Randy Bullock, Sunaree Bullock - Cheoah Bald to Wright Gap** - Hiked from Wright Gap approx. 4 mi to remove a large tree that had fallen across the trail in a narrow, steep area. Cut briars

and removed small brush in the corridor as time permitted.

**8/11 - John Lee - Sweat Heifer to Newfound Gap** - Removed 10-in blow down and 8-in blow down. Also picked up small branches and leaves.

**8/11 - Rick Waggener - Gap W of Masa Knob to Boulevard Tr** - Worked on drainage. Opened water bars Boulevard to gap W of Masa Knob. Cut back some of the briars between shelter & bear cables.

**8/12 - Franklin LaFond, Sarah Cousineau, Maxwell Moersch, William Blohland - Newfound Gap to Indian Gap/Rd Pr Tr** - This was an orientation outing for some new recruits. Cleared some weedy vegetation. Pruned back woody vegetation. Cleaned several waterbars. Added 1 new log waterbar. Reset 3 log steps. Added 3 new log steps, including backfill with crushed rock. Added stakes to several steps that were starting to blow out. Pounded down several stakes that had raised due to winter frost heaving.

**8/12 - Patricia Bryant, Peter Lloyd - Mt Love to Clingmans Dome** - Cleaned out water-bars; dug-out several side-channels to help move water from seeps off the trail.

**8/12 - Pete Berntsen - False Gap to Dry Sluice Gap** - Removed one two-inch and one 7-inch diameter trees from trail located about 0.1 mi SW of The Boulevard trail intersection. Removed one two-inch diameter tree hanging over the trail about 1.3 mi NE of Dry Sluice Gap. Met AT Sweat Crew at my work location near 1.5 mi NE of Dry Sluice Gap. They advised that there were no trees down out to False Gap and that storms were predicted. I rehabilitated (returned trail to proper width, removed protruding rock, fixed one water drain, added one water drain, and removed about 20 ft of berm on 91 ft of trail when distant thunder ended my work day. *(Please see photos below)*).

**8/13 - Randy Bullock, Sunaree Bullock - Stekoah Gap to Locust Cove Gap** - Brushed. Cleared large tree. Greeted 8 section hikers.

**8/15 - Randy Bullock, Sunaree Bullock - High Pt E of Walker Gap to Yellow Creek Gap** - Brushing, removed for blowdowns.

**8/17 - Tim Ryan, Jay Schmid, Richard Ward - Boulevard Tr to Sweat Heifer** - Cleared mud from several pooling areas on the trail, cleaned and extended drainage areas, repaired rock water bars, cut overhanging limbs from recent storm activity, cleaned debris from treadway.
